

Understanding Food Insecurity in District 73

Feeding Louisiana's three-level indicator of food insecurity is based on economic factors, access to food assistance programs, and the overall poverty rate. By incorporating specific data such as the number of households with food insecurity, SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) eligibility and enrollment rates, and comparisons to the parish poverty line, this model offers targeted insights for intervention. Below is a description of District 73's level defined as **Critical.**



Critical Definition: Households facing tangible and regular challenges in accessing sufficient and nutritious food. This group includes those eligible for SNAP benefits due to income levels but may or may not be currently receiving them. The critical level is marked by compromises in food quality, variety, and occasional disruptions in food intake.

Data Indicators:

- The number of households eligible for SNAP benefits, highlighting those at risk.
- Households eligible for but not receiving SNAP benefits, possibly due to barriers in the application process, lack of information, or stigma.
- Evidence of reduced meal quality and diversity based on community surveys, with a significant portion of income dedicated to food.
