Understanding Food Insecurity in District 98

Feeding Louisiana's three-level indicator of food insecurity is based on economic factors, access to food assistance programs, and the overall poverty rate. By incorporating specific data such as the number of households with food insecurity, SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) eligibility and enrollment rates, and comparisons to the parish poverty line, this model offers targeted insights for intervention. Below is a description of District 98's level defined as **Moderate.**



Moderate Definition: Households experiencing uncertainty about their ability to consistently access adequate food due to financial constraints or other barriers. These households may be above the poverty line but still face challenges in meeting their nutritional needs due to high living costs, underemployment, or sudden financial strains.

Data Indicators:

- Households reporting anxiety over food availability or ability to purchase needed food.
- A higher percentage of households just above the SNAP eligibility threshold, indicating potential vulnerability to food insecurity.
- Households that have fluctuating incomes, making them occasionally eligible for SNAP.
